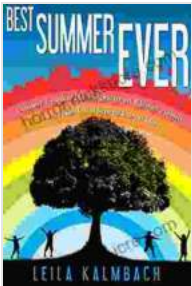

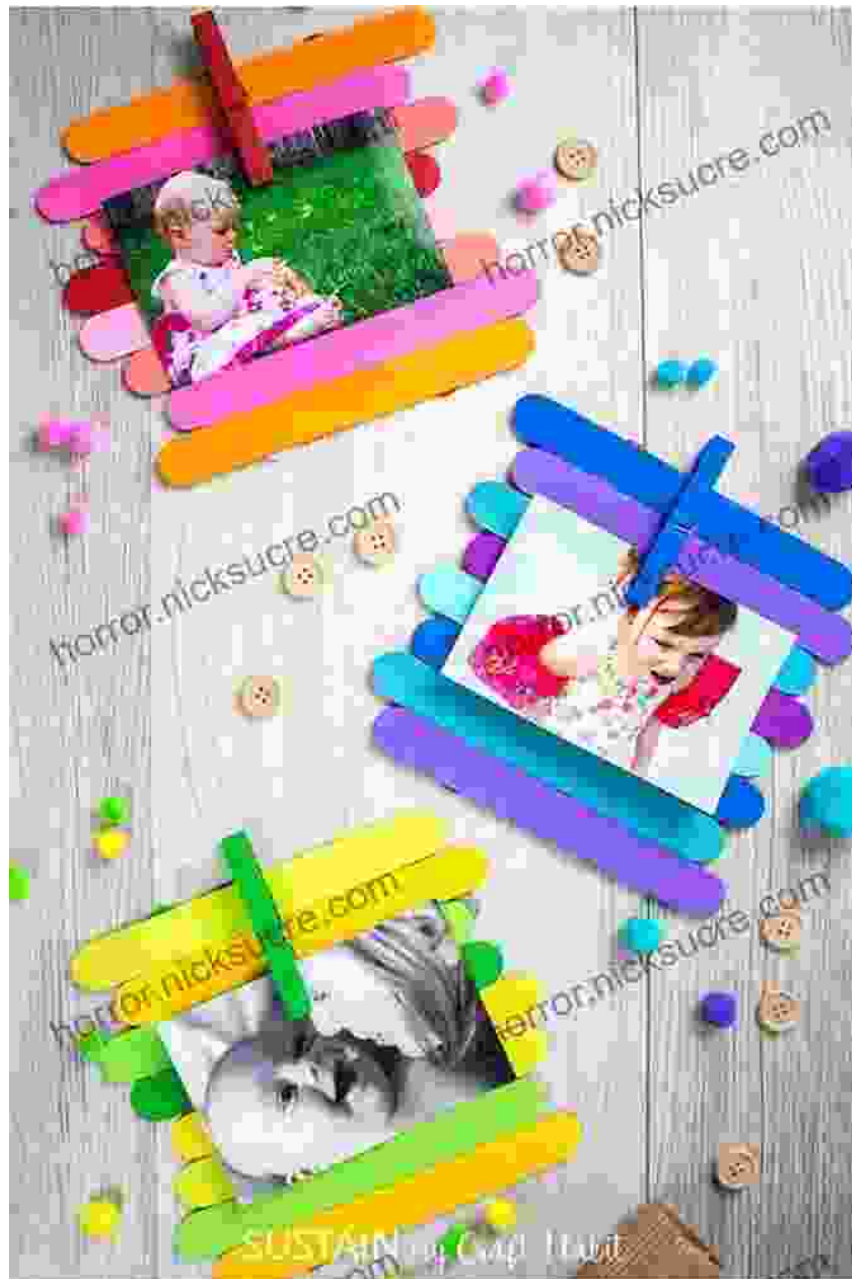
8. Paper Plate Masks

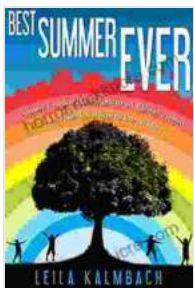
14. Paper Bag Lanterns

Button art is a great way for kids to develop their fine motor skills and creativity. Simply provide them with buttons and a piece of cardboard or canvas. Let them glue the buttons to

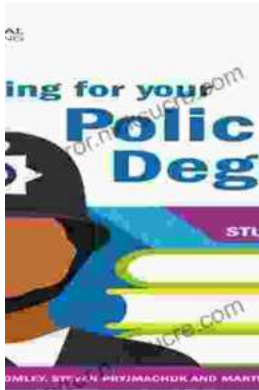


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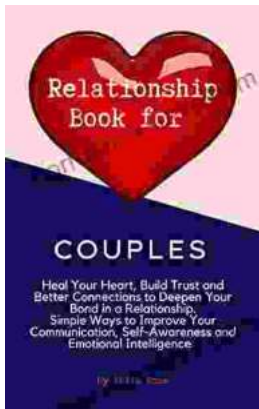
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
