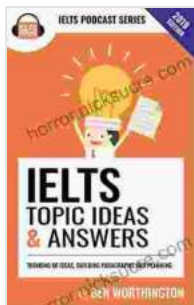

Each section of the test is scored on a scale of 0 to 9. A score of 9 is the highest possible score and a score of 0 is the lowest possible score. Candidates must achieve a minimum score of 6.5 in each section in order to pass the test.

There are two types of IELTS tests: the Academic IELTS test and the General Training IELTS test. The Academic IELTS test is designed for candidates who wish to study at an English-speaking university. The General Training IELTS test is designed for candidates who wish to migrate to an English-speaking country.

The IELTS test is offered in over 140 countries around the world. The test is administered by the British Council, IDP Education and the University of Cambridge ESOL Examinations.

## **IELTS Task Questions**

The IELTS test contains a variety of task questions. These questions are designed to assess the candidate's ability to listen, read, write and speak in English.

## Writing

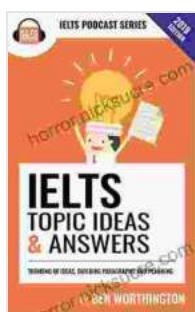
- **Brainstorm ideas.** What are some of the key points that you want to include in your essay or letter?

- **Develop your body paragraphs.** Each body paragraph should support your thesis statement with evidence from the text or recording.

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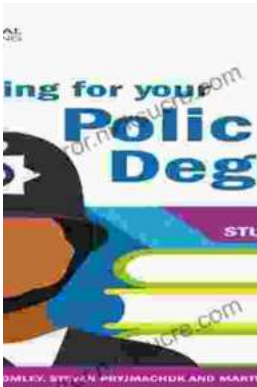
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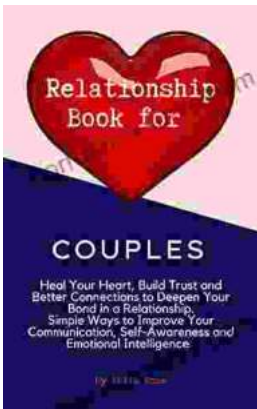
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
